Grants:

Per the last quarterly report, it was announced that SNTC received the full requested amount. The support and partnerships provided by the community helped achieve SNTC's goals.

Shop with a Cop: Every year in December, Silver Rider provides transportation for this program. It was very successful and Silver Rider transported 150 kids from Laughlin and Searchlight.

Outreach:

In 2020, Anna Talamo, Director of Operations, and Sue Bishop, Operations Supervisor, will begin to have a bigger presence in the community to get more information of the needs of Searchlight and promote the services that Silver Rider provides.

Safety and Security:

There were no incidents this quarter involving Searchlight.

Chair Kyle Myers asked if there <u>was were</u> any pickups at Cottonwood Cove. Ms. Bishop said no, there has not been a need or request in the past. Mr. Myers suggested that Silver Rider contact the residents to find out if there was a need for transportation. Chair Myers asked where the current pickups were now. Ms. Bishop said seniors receive door-to-door service. There is a mobile <u>panty-pantry</u> once a month and the pickup is on Cottonwood Road.

Janis Kostecky asked when is the pantry pickup and the regular pickup? Ms. Bishop said pantry pickup is once a month on the third Wednesday. Regular pickup is the second and fourth Tuesday of every month. There was also a decrease in fares from Searchlight to Henderson.

12. Searchlight Museum Guild to present an award to Searchlight Town Liaison, Dr. Brian Paulson.

Jane Overy, founder of the Searchlight Museum, along with Janis Kostecky and Joan Mesenbrink, presented a plaque to Dr. Brian Paulson. Ms. Overy said she has known Dr. Paulson for over 25 years due to her service on Community Development Advisory Committee (CDAC) for 15 years. During that time, Searchlight was able to acquire a lot of things over the years. Dr. Paulson was instrumental as a Clark County coordinator for this board and was helpful with getting some of these capital projects for Searchlight, which included the senior center, fire hydrants, two water holding tanks, and additional water lines

Ms. Overy introduced Searchlight Museum Guild Board members Butch and Janis Kostecky, Joan Mesenbrink, and Rose and Jerry Crawford, who could not be present tonight, and welcomed Dr. Paulson as a lifetime member of the Searchlight Museum Guild. Memberships help the community purchase needed items and provide care for the Searchlight Cemetery, she said.

Dr. Paulson was asked by Ms. Overy to approach the podium for which she presented him with the plaque, a memento given for all lifetime members. Dr. Paulson said this came as a surprise to him and expressed his appreciation for the honor. He said his heart loves history and in preserving historical preserving historical items and a lifetime membership was a way of giving back to the community.

Dr. Paulson spoke about his involvement with the CDAC as well as the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program over the years and how people like Jane Overy and Verlie Doing were instrumental in obtaining grant funds for Searchlight.

Ms. Overy said she wanted to do something before she left town, so she started the Searchlight Betterment Organization (SBO) with some younger town residents. She credited them for the wonderful things they are doing for the community, and said anything bought from Amazon can result with the SBO receiving a little kickback from the purchases.

13. Announcements of upcoming neighborhood meetings and County or community meetings and events. (For discussion only)

Judy Bundorf said she is on the board for the newly formed Friends of Walking Box Ranch and announced that on Saturday, May 9<sup>th</sup>, UNLV and BLM will be sponsoring an event at the Ranch. More information forthcoming at a later date.

Dr. Brian Paulson said the Clark County Comprehensive Planning Department hired a new consultant in January. The Clark County CP Master Plan (Title 30) will be updated which is done every 5-10 years. Representatives from each TAB will be appointed at an upcoming TAB meeting and invited to participate in the planning meetings.

There will be opportunities for public input in addition to the TABs. This project is anticipated for completion in December 2022 or 2023 at the latest.

Judy Bundorf said in regards to Friends of Walking Box Ranch, in the near future they will be looking for docent volunteers from this area.

a) Clark County is currently taking applications to fill a vacancy on the Searchlight Town Advisory Board (TAB).

The appointment will be for the remainder of the current term ending January 4, 2021. The Searchlight TAB holds regularly scheduled public meetings. Applicants must be eligible to vote and live within the town boundaries.

Functions of the Searchlight TAB include: hearing matters pertaining to the town (long range planning, land use, zoning, public works projects, new ordinances, etc.), providing input regarding these matters to the Board of County Commissioners (BCC), forwarding community concerns/problems to County Staff for resolution, and disseminating information received from the BCC and County staff to town residents.

Michele Brown, Secretary, Searchlight Betterment Organization, read a report for March 11, 2020.

The Searchlight Betterment Organization is currently working with Aren Hall of Equinox Gold on a Searchlight Beautification project. We have been given the opportunity to have Joshua Trees planted and maintained (with owner's permission) for three months by contractors hired by Equinox Gold. At this time we have approximately 20 trees whose locations have been secured. There will also be an opportunity for the community to pick up Yucca, beavertail cactus, and barrel cactus at a "to be announced location" these plants will need to be planted and cared for by the person picking them up.

The Searchlight Betterment Organization is now holding meetings which are open to the public, to be held the first Monday of each month, located at the Senior Center at 5:00 p.m. Agendas will be posted a week in advance. If anyone would like an item on the agenda, contact Michele Brown no later than two weeks before the next scheduled meeting.

The Searchlight Betterment Organization would like to request to be on the TAB agenda quarterly for reports and updates starting in June.
